

SUPERINTENDENT ZuMmary— Questions about our Future and Facilities

At a recent School Board Retreat here in the ZM Schools, we met to talk about where we are as a district regarding a wide array of issues including teaching and learning; supporting positive student behavior; technology usage; differentiated learning; communication; funding and our facilities. We came to man positive conclusions bout where we are and where we strive to go as a school district. We are extremely leased with the state of our schools, especially the performance of our students and staff, alongside the strong support of our communities. However, we know we need to continue improving and finding ways we can do things even better.

One of the many areas we have genuinely tried to improve since I became superintendent is increasing our revenues while examining our expenditures. We have engaged in rigorously writing grants and finding more ways to bring revenue into our district. We are arguably experiencing a time in which the ZM Schools have received more grants than ever, including two more successful grants from the Minnesota Department of Education that we have received in the last few weeks. We have also made significant physical changes throughout our district in order to save money. We have recently completed projects such as upgrading our building seals and changing out our lightbulbs (the change is quite noticeable) which will produce significant savings over time. Our rooftop solar projects that will soon be installed will also save us a projected 2 million dollars over


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the life of the projects. All of the changes are intended to make the most out of every tax dollar spent by our local taxpayers towards our schools.

However, we are nearing the end of an *Operating Levy* that ZM taxpayers approved several years ago that is used to keep class sizes small and to appropriately staff our schools. We will be bringing that levy or a similar levy to you as voters in the fall for a vote. The good news is that with either a renewal or a slight increase in the levy, the tax impact will be nonexistent or minimal because the levy is already on your property tax-

es and has been for a number of years. To be completely frank, if this levy passes we will be able to continue to do the things

we are currently doing; but if it does not pass, we will be making significant staffing reductions, including looking at things like increasing class sizes. I do not write this to be threatening, but rather to be honest and transparent on this issue.





frastructure and that we have had to expend significant resources due to events such as the high school gym floor flooding, roof leaks, and a broken broiler/heating system. These are but a few of the facilities issues we have put band aids on this year when we have probably needed major surgery. However, additions, upgrades and such are not the decision of a superintendent; these decisions are to be made by the communities. Major facilities changes are usually funded through what is called a *Facilities Bond*, which also must be approved through an election. Bonds are different than levies, as bonds are for buildings while levies are for operations, such as staff. If we were to vote on a bond in the future, it would be a different ballot question than the referendum question.

I will be planning a series of community meetings before the end of the school year to receive your thoughts on our facilities. I am also asking that if you are part of any kind of local organization, please invite me and/or any of our ZM School Board members to a meeting in the near future so we can have a dialogue about our facilities. I am willing to come to a meeting at any time and on any day or night. Following these meetings, we will gather even more information from you through surveys or questionnaires. We promise not to bother you with phone calls. Our goal is to find out what is important to you in regards to our school facilities in order to help us set the direction for "Building a Bridge to the Future." If we run a bond question, it will include facilities ideas that come from all of you—our district residents.



Please do not bring in medication the morning of the trip. Thank you for your cooperation!





WASH THAT WINTER GRIME AWAY!!



The following personnel items were approved: New Hires: Susan Evans, paraprofessional, beginning Feb. 13, 2017 and Derek Hatten, 9th grade baseball coach, beginning in the 2017 season. Retirement: Jeanette Richardson, 1st grade teacher, at end of the school year and Cindy Wendroth, kindergarten teacher. Last day will be Sept. 21, 2017. Resignation: Kaitlin Buck, high school/college program assistant, as of Aug. 31, 2016.

The following grants and plans were approved for submission: The MN Dept of Education Innovation Pilot Grant, written in cooperation with Pine Island Schools; Safe Routes to School Planning Grant; Achievement and Integration Plan.

The board approved using the Southeast Service Cooperative's guidelines for the insurance bidding process (HITA-health insurance transparency act) for insurance effective Sept. 1, 2017. The board approved the 403b plan as presented. The board preamble was approved as revised at the February work session.

Mr. Niles requested that the board become an advocate for equity in funding, especially the agricultural tax credits. He requested that Mr. Anger contact St. Charles Schools to see what they are doing as a school to promote information. This will be a retreat item, along with referendum and bond discussions, and a discussion of WILD days.

The board was informed that the EMZM has given notice that they wish to commence negotiations with the school district for the 2017-19 teacher agreement.

Also approved was a call for bids fro the 2016-17 vocational construction house. Bidding deadline was set for March 17, 2017 and the minimum bid accepted has to be at least \$299,917.

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BOARD OF EDUCATION MEETING MINUTES

The February school board meeting was held Monday, February 27 at 7:00 p.m. in the high school media center in Zumbrota. The usual business, including payment of bills, was conducted.

Recognition: The following groups were recognized for their service and accomplishments:

- ZM School Board for their service throughout the year.
 School Board Recognition Week was February 20 24.
- Sugar Loaf Bus Company for their exemplary service to ZM.
 February 22 was set aside as School Bus Driver Appreciation Day.
- ZM Dance Team members were in attendance and recognized for their state dance performance in jazz and kick.
 Three seniors will be attending the All-State Dance on March 11.
- The Symphonic Band was commended on their performance at the Minnesota Music Educators Association on Feb. 16
- Miles Klotz was recognized for his All State Band/Orchestra
 Hall performance, Dalton Ludington for the All State Choir,
 and Brynn Karstens for Grade 9-10 American Choral Directors
 Association performance. These students were not able to
 attend as they were participating in Pep Band at the time of
 the meeting.

Mr. Anderson reported for the middle/high school. Registration for 2017-18 has been completed for grades 6-11. Mr. Anderson explained the college courses that will be offered in the next school year as well as the student grades from the current courses offered through Southwest State. He congratulated the sym-

phonic band and Mr. Cory on their performance at the MN Music Educators Association and the dance and wrestling teams and coaches on their state placings.

Mr. Rasmussen reported for the primary and elementary schools, noting it has been a busy month for activities – I Love to Read Month, Black History Month, etc. The NAEP tests were given to selected fourth grade students in math and reading. Grades 1-4 staff has also completed training in Schoology and have their curriculum and assessments set up.

Mr. Anger reported that enrollment was 1,179 for February. The treasurer's report to the board was available for review. Mr. Anger informed the board that ZM received a Pathway II Fund Scholarship award in the amount of \$45,000 over two years to help fund preschool scholarships. SHIP grants have been submitted to Wabasha and Goodhue counties for assistance with creating safe routes to school, healthy living campaigns, which includes walking and riding bikes to school, and "Rethink Your Drink" training through phy ed and health classes. Mr. Anger also informed the board that there is a bill currently in the legislature that would promote e-learning days, such as ZM's WILD Days. Mr. Anderson and Ms. Heitmann will testify at a hearing on March 2. The Equalizing ZM Families was thanked for their donation towards unpaid lunch balances for families in need.

Reports were also available from the Southeast Service Coop, Wasioja Education Technology Cooperative, and the Goodhue County Education District.

FFA HAS BUSY JANUARY

Over the past few weeks, the ZM FFA Chapter has sent members to different camps and conferences to help develop their leadership skills. These camps are a great way for members to meet new people and to keep up with past friends.

On January 8-10, Kyra Nichols and Casey Dykes attended the Ag Policy Experience. Through this camp, members from all over the state of Minnesota have the opportunity for an inside look at how agriculture works in the government.
