

NURSE NOTES

School is back in session and so is cold an flu season! The Minnesota Department of Health has compiled a screening tool for parents to use when deciding whether or not to keep their child home from school. Please follow these guidelines and keep your child home if in doubt to lessen exposure to other children and school staff. Thank you for your cooperation!

<u>Does your child have:</u>

- A fever of 100 degrees F or higher? (Be sure to take the temperature before giving fever-reducing medicines such as Tylenol)
- 2. Sore throat?
- 3. Cough?

Should I Keep My Child Home?

• If you answered "yes" for fever AND one of the other symptoms, keep your child home for at least 24 hours after his/her fever is gone without fever-reducing medicine. For many children this will be 5 to 7 days. Your child should feel

well enough to participate in school before returning. If you have questions about your child's health or symptoms, call your child's doctor or clinic.

If your child has been diagnosed by a doctor or clinic with a different disease, such as strep, follow your doctor or clinic's recommendation and school policy for when to return to school.

What Should I tell My Child's School?

- If you answered "yes" for fever AND one of the other symptoms, tell the school that your child is home with influenzalike illness.
- If your child has been diagnosed by a doctor or clinic with a different disease, such as strep, tell your child's school.

The Board of Education held their monthly meeting Monday, September 28 in the ZMES Media Center in Mazeppa. The usual business was conducted, including payment of bills.

Reports:

Scott Cory, band director, was in attendance to report on the 2016 band trip to California. He outlined the proposed agenda and funding options. He asked permission of the board for the trip and to do a Kwik Trip car wash card fundraiser in addition to the frozen food sales. He also discussed insurance options in case of student cancellation. He would like to offer a travel insurance for students wishing to purchase it. The board approved the trip and insurance, but wanted to table the budgeted donation until speaking with the superintendent.

Aaron Schumacher went over the proposed changes to the teacher development and evaluation plan, which had already been approved by EMZM. He was requesting board approval of the changes outlined and the board gave that approval.

Mr. Anderson reported for the middle and high school. He summarized the beginning of the year activities as well as Homecoming. He commented the school liaison officer is a huge asset to our school this year. Teacher observations will begin later this month and curriculum offerings will be discussed in October.

Mr. Rasmussen reported for the primary and elementary schools. He was pleased to announce that the elementary was named a 2015 Reward School by the Minnesota Department of Education. Data meetings will be held to develop plans for utilize the ADSIS and Reading Corps people.

The principals went over the superintendent report in Mr. Anger's absence. Enrollment for September was 1,159, up considerably over last year in September, which was 1,128. 
