The school board held their monthly work session on April 9. Items for discussion included the following:

- Water testing for lead per legislative requirements. This
 is a required legislative action and must be completed by
 July 1, 2018. The board reviewed the information and it
 will be on the April 23 agenda for approval.
- 2) School resource officer. The school is waiting for the city to contact us in regard to a new contract.
- 3) 2018-19 School staff discussion. There are no nonrenewals or reassignments as of this work session. The peer coaches for 2018-19 are Aaron Schumacher and Rebecca Sjolander. Mr. Harvey will bring more information about the curriculum/staff development position to a future board meeting.
- 4) School vehicle purchase and liquidation. A proposal for a fleet vehicle was presented to the board as well as a proposal to liquidate the 2001 Dodge pickup. This will be an action item at the April 23 board meeting.
- 5) House lot purchase. The construction advisory board will meet and make a recommendation on future purchases.
- 6) Policy review from MSBA. MSBA has completed the district policy guide audit. Information was shared with the board regarding this audit and the policies will be brought to the board for approval with the changes suggested by the MSBA audit. MSBA did not recommend changes to #310 Elementary School Principal, #311 Middle School Principal, or #312 High School Principal so they will be on the April 23 agenda for approval with no changes.

The board approved reducing Roxanne Webster's full-time teaching position to part-time beginning in the 2018-19 school year and to terminate Veronica Garcia, education assistant in the elementary, as of April 9, 2018. The work session adjourned at 9:00 p.m.

The regular monthly board meeting was held April 23 with the usual business conducted, including payment of the bills.

Rachel Miller, ZM Robotics coach, and the team were present to give a report and demonstration from their robotics rookie year. The team mentors were also in attendance. Thanks were expressed to the mentors for their time in helping make this program a success.

Mr. Anderson reported for the middle and high school. Class scheduling for 2018-19 is complete. There has been interest in moving graduation from Saturday night to Friday night. The board requested parental input and there will be further discussion at an upcoming work session.

Mr. Rasmussen reported for the primary and elementary school. MCA testing has been proceeding with little issues. Kindergarten Round-Up will be held April 27 and orientation for 2nd and 6th graders will be held later in May.

Ms. Ahern reported that the online speech program has been successful this year. She thanked Ms. Langley and the paras for their assistance during MCA testing. May 17 special education students will participated in a day of track and field events in Red Wing.

Mr. Harvey reported that enrollment was 1,188 for April. The treasurer's report was available for board review.

A quote for \$26,357.32 for a 2018 Ford Transit Passenger Wagon was received from Nelson Auto Center through the Southeast Service Cooperative bidding process. Mr. Harvey checked with Zumbrota Ford and, if they are able to match that quote, ZM would purchase the vehicle from them. This will be a purchase from the 2018-19 capital budget for transporting special education students. As of the meeting date, no quote was received. It was also recommended that the 2001 Dodge pickup be liquidated.

The Minnesota legislature has passed requirements for water testing for lead that schools must pass by July 1, 2018. ZM has had water tested and only one spigot was elevated and that was not above levels for safety. The water will be tested again prior to July 1 and Mr. Niles recommended that the spigots testing in the top five for levels be flushed prior to the testing.

An error was found on the approved 2018-19 school calendar (April 31 is incorrect). Teachers were surveyed and 75% wanted April 18, 2019 added as a student day. This revision was approved by the board.

The district polices #310 Elementary School Principal, #311 Middle School Principal, and #312 High School Principal were presented and approved with no revisions.

The meeting was adjourned at 7:54 p.m. by Chair Hinchley.

The resignation of Ann Husbyn, special education assistant, was approved effective at the end of the 2017-18 school year. The resignation of Ellis Bloomfield, special education assistant, was approved effective April 17, 2018. The resignation of Calley Gunhus, Cougar Care, was approved effective 8/17/17.

The Achievement and Integration budget was approved for school year 2019 in the amount of \$37,838. A one year Teachers on Call contract for school year 2018-19 was approved.

A resolution was approved to non-renew the teaching contract of special education teacher, Molly Lindhart, at the end of the 2017-18 school year because her variance for teaching special education will expire.

Minutes were available from the Wasioja Education Technology Cooperative, the Southeast Service Cooperative, and the Goodhue County Education District.

GRADE 5 MATH MASTERS COMPETE

On Friday, April 20, the Zumbrota-Mazeppa fifth grade math masters teams competed against other fifth grade math students from twelve different schools around Southeast Minnesota. Each team can have up to five students, but each student starts with five tests done individually. Students finish the day with three tests on which they work as a team and are a bit more involved than the individual tests. The two Z-M teams did very well by placing 13 and 20 out of the 36 teams competing at Bethel Lutheran in Rochester. There are approximately twenty sites statewide holding competitions for fifth graders who all take the same tests at the same time.

As individuals, the students start with a fact drill that had questions like 7 x 9 - 4 x 9 - 7 (answer 20), then progressed to four separate tests with story problems. Students have ten minutes to finish each test, consisting of eight questions. On the fact drill, Tyler Bromeling took home the 7th place medallion out of the 177 students competing. Michael Winkels placed 13th, Elizabeth Winkels was 15th, and Taite Raasch received the award for 18th. Only the top 20 students received recognition out of all the competitors. Nearly all Z-M students were in the top 50% on the fact drill, which shows that these students definitely know their math facts and order of operations.

Math Masters is designed to promote excellence in critical thinking skills and problem solving abilities, as well as provide recognition to students for academic effort and achievement. Teams and individuals from private and public schools may compete in Math Masters. The Hormel Foundation, along with other individuals and businesses, support Math Masters through their donations.

Medication will not be sent home with students. If they have not been picked up by the last day of school they will be disposed of. We will <u>NOT</u> store medication over the summer. <u>Immunizations</u>: Immunizations the school has on record are viewable in Parent Portal in Infinite Campus. Students will not be able to start school in the fall without up to date immunizations records on file with the school.

If you choose to file exemptions for any immunizations, forms are available on the ZM School website under Parents/Health Services/ Immunizations. Or you can contact the school nurse at 507-732-7848. Students will not be eligible to attend the first day of school in 2018 until we have up to date immunizations on file.
